Strategic Overview

Stable constitutional monarchy/Strategic political decisions

- Assure the monarchy's survival against regional and internal turmoil
- > Gain international support for Morocco's position on Western Sahara
- Establish beneficial trade and investment relations.

Markets a bright image of the country

- Religious tolerance/relatively secular
- > Friendly nation to Western powers
- Reforms/Economic growth/Relative political stability

Maintains a centrist stance

- International strategic flexibility/Support from multiple partners
- Strategically/operationally aligned with U.S. security objectives
- Not always in agreement with its foreign policy

Values partnerships with the U.S.

- > Proud to be the first country to recognize the U.S. in 1777
- ➤ Longest unbroken Treaty of Amity since 1786 (John Adams and Thomas Jefferson were the signatories for U.S.)
- Free Trade Agreement in 2004
- > U.S. partner in counter-terrorism, designated a major non-NATO ally in 2004
- Partnership with Utah National Guard since 2003



SPP Broader Strategic Benefits



Reform and regionalization

- Fresh thinking/Unique perspective to regional debates on U.S. policy priorities
- Strong bilateral relations/Move quickly in implementing reform
- Benefits exported to the region

Internal and regional security

- Share best practices/Templates/Assessments/Monitoring
- Impact critical areas (Law Enforcement, Rule of Law, Intelligence)
- Promote shared U.S.-Morocco interests/Regional stability

Strategic alignment /Cultural values

- Key messages and measures/Energize strategic relationships
- Highlight cultural similarities and common values
- Influence decision-makers/U.S. support on key political issues

Morocco's role in Africa/Regional Economics

- Geo-economics benefits of furthering U.S. interests in Africa
- Security engagements and training/UN missions
- Support from African countries on key political issues



SPP Focused Benefits

Counter-terrorism: Enhance Morocco's vital role in MENA's security environment

- Upgrade their counter-terrorism efforts internally and regionally
- > Holistic strategy/economic development/counter radicalization programs
- > SPP can impact bigger areas (trafficking, illegal immigration, intelligence-sharing, and financial controls)
- Regional leadership and influence/Major partner for regional stabilization (Libya, sub-Saharan Africa)

Enhanced security cooperation with the U.S.:

- ➤ Open and implemented 84 cases/\$3.99 billion
- ➤ DoS approved deal for \$4.8 billion (25 F-16C/D Block 72 fighters, upgrade to existing fleet of 23 F-16s to the more advanced F-16V Block 52 + configuration)
- ➤ EDA: One of the most active EDA countries, unit specialized in EDA

Hosts regional engagements and exercises

- > Go to country for hosting AFRICAN LION Exercise
- > Interoperability and readiness
- > Increased familiarity on both sides (structures, capabilities, processes, people)



Some Challenges...

Programmatic, Cooperation and Country Dynamics Issues

- SPP's impact is greater when linked to other programs
 - Mil-mil
 - Mil-civ
 - Civ-civ
- SPP's doesn't meet all the needs of the partner-country
 - Risk to fall in a steady state
 - Lower expectations/understand the limitations
 - May lead to erosion of trust over the years
- Partnership doesn't always translate in political support
 - Focus on military interests
 - Not enough leverage to overcome nagging diplomatic challenges (Western Sahara)
- Sustainability/Organizational issues
 - Visible gap between officers and Non-commissioned officers
 - Power concentration in the capital and in headquarters
 - Prioritization of security issues over organizational and personnel issues
 - Abuse of power, hazing, nepotism
 - Gender integration issues (females mostly in admin and social services)
